The last few months have brought many challenges, but as we worked through communicating with government, preparing guidelines and proposals and figuring out how to adapt to our evolving circumstances as music educators, the strength of our community and your willingness to work together and problem solve on behalf of our students and our colleagues has been abundantly clear. Each of our partner organizations has really stepped up to the plate. Judy Giesbrecht and the Tempo committee have done a great job redesigning our fall conference to an online forum. MBA supported communication between teachers with "The Answer is in the Room". MCGA went ahead with the Creative Music Festival, giving students an outlet for expressing their thoughts and feeling through music. In the absence of summer Orff courses, MOC has continued to offer online PD opportunities. MCA took the lead in petitioning government to revisit guidelines around singing and wind instrument playing. All groups were able to collaborate and contributed extensively to the AMAM/MMEA's Returning to Manitoba Music Classrooms and have continued to work hard throughout the spring and summer to make this school year as good as it can be.

The MMEA is unique across Canada in its mandate to provide a unified voice for music education in our province. I would like to acknowledge the work of early planners Bill Kristjanson, Eric Marshall and Karen Tole-Henderson for their vision in setting up an organization that is perfectly situated to address our current and future challenges. Karen finishes her tenure this year as Past President of MMEA. Her strong leadership and commitment have been palpable throughout her time on the board, and she will be sorely missed. We thank her for her selfless commitment to MMEA over the years.

I am really looking forward to a time when we can be together again at MBCI, hopefully in October 2021. In the meantime, I know you feel as I do that we share a connection that has only been strengthened by our time apart. Music Festivals in a COVID-19 World: Making Lemonade Out of Lemons

Sadly, COVID-19 has taken a very heavy toll on many Canadians. It has also taken a massive toll on the music education system in Canada, particularly with performance-based education. Musicfest Canada was forced to cancel our May 2020 Nationals in Calgary. Most of the regional spring festivals in Canada were also forced to cancel, leaving innumerable bands, orchestras and choirs across the country with no festival performance opportunities until 2021 at the earliest.

In April 2020, MusicFest Canada established a partnership with the National Arts Centre Orchestra to try and mitigate the loss of opportunity for many of the students selected from across the country for some of our Honour Ensembles. Under the direction of Maestro Alexander Shelley, the National Arts Centre Orchestra, Heritage Canada, CBC and Music Monday presented 3 virtual concerts featuring our students, with views in excess of 100,000. Individual members of the Denis Wick Canadian Wind Orchestra, Woodshed Canadian Percussion Ensemble and Thomastik-Infeld Canadian String Orchestra received 2 lessons



courtesy of the NACO musicians, and a sectional prior to recording the concerts. The Ellison Canadian Honour Choir was featured on Music Monday and as part of Heritage Canada's Canada Day Celebrations. The concerts are posted on our website at musicfest.ca. We are working actively with a variety of partners to create similar virtual experiences for all six of our 2021 Honour Ensembles (Denis Wick Canadian Wind Orchestra, Woodshed Canadian Percussion Ensemble, Thomastik-Infeld Canadian String Orchestra, Conn-Selmer Centerstage Jazz Band, Humber National Youth Jazz Combo) should we be unable to run them live in Toronto next May.

For many elementary and high school music programs, festival participation is a key element of their educational experience, and a strong motivator for the students involved. MusicFest Canada has a Canada-wide network of 58 affiliated festivals that support performance-based music education. We have been

working with our regional festivals since April 2020, brainstorming, sharing expertise, and exploring various scenarios for spring 2021 regional festivals. We are offering support to all of our Affiliates wishing to offer a virtual festival at the regional level. We are creating a guide which will include the minimum equipment specs for ensembles in the classroom, the minimal equipment for the adjudicators, a step-by-step manual for the software and a troubleshooting guide. In addition, we will have our IT volunteer staff available online to help regional festivals with real-time issues.

Necessity is the Mother of Invention – 3 in 1!

The primary driving force for most new inventions is an urgent and presenting need. MusicFest Canada's "3 In 1 Nationals" will run May 17-21, 2021. All four Divisions (Concert Band, Orchestra, Instrumental Jazz, and Choral) will be offered. Given the smaller size and wide range of instrumentation of ensembles due to COVID-19 restrictions, all existing Nationals

invitations will be expanded to allow the teacher to bring whatever type of ensemble is currently possible for that particular school. All groups who held an Invitation to the 2019 Festival (Calgary) will be able use that Invitation for the 2021 Festival in Toronto.

Schools with a valid Invitation in one Division (i.e.: Concert Band) will be permitted to register Ensembles to participate in any class and category of that Division, and any class and category of the other Divisions (i.e.: Orchestra, Jazz, Choral). With a performance landscape that will likely (hopefully) evolve and change over the next few months, the deadline for registering using a 2nd-year invitation has been extended to January 15, 2021.

MusicFest has ensured that all qualifying ensembles can participate by introducing a new three-platform model:

 Onsite (traditional) Festival: We are continuing with plans for a traditional onsite festival in Toronto. Since most (if not all) participating schools would be doing a sameday field trip, all feature concerts will be offered at lunchtime. Artists will include York University Jazz Combo, The Toronto Symphony Orchestra Chamber Ensemble, The Humber Experience and FreePlay.

Schools impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic that will not be able to travel to the Festival in Toronto (and schools that traditionally have been unable to attend the Festival due to the travel expense; this will make MusicFest Nationals accessible to schools who never could have consider attending in the past) will be able to participate in the Festival virtually in two new ways (for more information go to www.musicfest and click on "Virtual Festival"):

- 2) <u>Virtual:</u> Ensembles with Official Invitations can perform virtually for adjudication live for a panel of adjudicators followed by a 1 hour clinic.
- 3) <u>Video Recording:</u> Ensembles with Official Invitations can submit a video recording, which will be adjudicated by a panel of adjudicators, and a clinician will arrange for a 1 hour clinic.

In all three Festivals, participating ensembles will receive digital results and awards will be mailed following the adjudication and clinic. A copy of the adjudicated performance will be made available. All ensemble performances from each of the three platforms will be streamed during the Festival in May.

None of us know how the next school year will unfold, and we all have to be nimble and look for opportunities to promote music education. Perhaps when we are in a post-COVID world, we will have added some pedagogical approaches that will make the long-term view even richer. At MusicFest Canada, we have been brainstorming, discussing, researching and working since mid-March to ensure that we can continue to provide meaningful performance-based activities for students from across Canada, and be a support to all school programs as they search for new ways to involve and motivate their students in these unusual and challenging times.
